White set up two tactics with his bishops...BB5 and BG5...what are these tactics called?

Wow! White got aggressive with his bishops! I think white wanted an early victory...do a Billy Jack on his opponent and go back to sip a soda in the mountains! LOL! Question...Why did Black sacrifice his rook on F8? Or did Black simply blunder?

White came alive...beats Black across the middle line and starts controlling more and more space. Was Black that upset about losing his rook? Or is Black engineering a skillful masterpiece?

I have to admit Black's 15th move surprised me (BB6 check). White pushed forward to attack the castled Black King. Then with QE2 white backs off. He becomes passive and Black strikes back like some sort of Star Wars Empire!

Stop! Black did QD6 back up with BC7: are you seeing what I am seeing? Did White observe the whole board before doing E6xF6? Black clobbers white with the obvious QxH2# move...checkmate! Did someone say, "It is Hammer Time!"
